DON'T SAY STOP LOOK IT UP

Weak opiates and breastfeeding

- Codeine is contraindicated in breastfeeding (MHRA, EMA)
- Dihydrocodeine or tramadol can be considered during breastfeeding. This should be at the lowest effective dose and for the shortest duration necessary
- Families should be educated about the potential symptoms of opiate toxicity in the infant
- Infants exposed to either dihydrocodeine or tramadol should be monitored by the caregivers for sedation, breathing difficulties, constipation, difficulty feeding and adequate weight gain. Neonates are most at risk
